These reports are purely for your information, the teachers meet with me to discuss each child's progress and any further support or intervention that is needed to help children reach their potential.

Y5 travelled to Ufton Court for their school trip on Tuesday, which was a huge success! They took part in so many activities to further their learning on the Vikings and came back full of excitement.

It was a such a wonderful MAGS morning yesterday! The children were so excited to share their poems, songs and limericks. The turnout from mums, aunties, grandmothers and sisters was the most we've seen! To see everyone in classrooms supporting our children is lovely. Thank you to those who were able to attend.

We also packed the Y5/6 Science Fair into the afternoon. It is truly amazing the projects that the children create and, even more so, how they are able to explain their discoveries. The rest of the children in the school had the opportunity to visit the exhibitions as well.

Jesus healed the blind man and he received the joy of sight and faith! This coming week, children are invited to celebrate the joy we have in following Jesus, so they can see with eyes of faith who He really is. This Lent, we can say 'Yes!' to the joy that Jesus offers us.

The Week That Was - KS1

Year R: This week Reception have been learning about the story of "The Good Samaritan" and about how we should always help those in need and be kind to everyone we meet. We thought about how people care for us in our day-to-day lives and pretended to be doctors for the day in our role-play area. In maths we have been using Numicon shapes to see how many different ways we can make 10 and learning a song to help us remember our number bonds. In literacy we have been reading the story "Farmer Duck" and using our Fred talk to write speech bubbles for the things the animals say in the story.

Year 1: Year 1 have had a very busy this week. In RE We have learned about the Widow's Mite and how we must give generously to support those in need. In Science we have been deciding whether things are plants or not and what common factors they share. We ended our week with Mags day. What a wonderful way to celebrate the many special adults in our lives. Thank you so much for coming in to support your children and for helping to make our puppets. They look fantastic! Well done, Year 1!

Year 2: Year 2 have been looking at the Jesus dying on the cross this week and thinking about why he did and how we might have felt if we were there. The children really thought about the reasons behind him doing this and understanding that it was for our sins. We had some really good class discussions on it where the children brought forward lots of ideas. This week has been our assessment week and so the children have worked so hard completing these. We looked at life cycles in science this week where we had a look at what all animals ate and what type of animal they were, for example, a herbivore. It was lovely to see lots of you for MAGS day and the children loved having you in the classroom and showing you there work. The children have worked so hard this week. Have a lovely long weekend and well done Year 2!!

The Week That Was - KS2

Year 3: This week in Year Three, we have enjoyed a rich mix of learning, beginning with our RE work where we explored the similarities between the miracle of Jesus feeding the five thousand, the Last Supper and Mass today, noticing how each moment centres on sharing food, gathering as a community and recognising Jesus presence in acts of giving and remembrance. During our assessment week, we have been focused on consolidating our knowledge while also taking the chance to showcase the progress we have made across our subjects. In History, we examined the remains of the Amesbury Archer and discussed what his belongings reveal about how people of the Bronze Age lived, what they valued and the beliefs they may have held about status and the afterlife. In Computing, we compared open ended questions with 'yes or no questions' before creating our own branching databases using the online platform j2data, ready to present our learning with confidence during MAGS morning.

Year 4: Year 4 have had a wonderfully busy week showing just how amazing they are in Reading, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation and maths! In maths, we've been strengthening our fluency by practising the 7 times table and using quick-fire strategies to build confidence. For Science Week, we took on an exciting engineering challenge using spaghetti and marshmallows to create strong, stable structures — lots of problem-solving and teamwork on display. Our RSE learning focused on understanding the different ways people can pay for things, from cash to cards to digital methods. In History, we explored Hadrian's Wall and imagined life as a Roman soldier stationed there. The children wrote fantastic recounts describing the harsh weather, the food they would have eaten, and the clothing they would have worn. We also had a brilliant MAGS morning with our wonderful grown-ups. In DT, we constructed our cars, using hand saws and glue guns to build the frame before designing the body creatively and carefully. The children were so proud of their finished vehicles!

The Week That Was - KS2

Year 5: What a week it has been! In RE the class have been learning more about sin and the different types; mortal and venial. They have been looking at how to reconcile from these different types of sin and what it means if you commit one of these. Tuesday was the best school trip day I think I have ever been on. Ufton Court hosted us so well from the moment we arrived to the minute we left. The children thoroughly enjoyed role playing in a battle and protecting their thane, embarking on Viking voyage and plundering lands across the Viking world and also participating in a Viking burial. It has been a fantastic week for Science too as the children undertook an experiment about air resistance and built boats with different shaped hulls. They put them to test on the school pond. This was shortly followed by participating in the Annual School Science Fayre. The level of entries keeps getting better year on year and it was a proud moment to listen to the class explain their experiments and investigations using scientific language. The class have also made Mother's Day cards with their limericks written inside that were created in English lessons this week and performed at the MAGS assembly.

Year 6: Year 6 have had a wonderfully busy week filled with creativity and learning. As part of our DT project, the children continued developing their Automata toys. We are very grateful to our fantastic MAGS, who joined us to help build the wooden frames—their support made the session both enjoyable and productive. In Maths, the children have been working hard on finding percentages of amounts, showing growing confidence as they applied their skills to different problems. In Writing, our focus has been on creating detailed character and setting descriptions, with pupils using ambitious vocabulary to bring their ideas to life. A highlight of the week was the Science Fair. Year 6 were amazing, confidently sharing their investigations and demonstrating impressive scientific understanding. They engaged brilliantly with visitors' questions. Well done to all of Year 6 for a fantastic week of effort and achievement!

Year 5 & 6 Science Fair - A Fantastic Success!

Our Year 5 and 6 Science Fair was a huge success, showcasing an impressive range of creative and thoughtful investigations. Each project reflected the hard work, curiosity, and scientific thinking our students have developed this year. We are incredibly proud of all the pupils for the effort they put into their experiments and presentations. A big thank you also goes to our parents and carers—their support at home played a huge role in helping students bring their ideas to life.

We are delighted to announce the finalists who will be representing our school at the **Xavier Science Fair Grand Final on 24th March**. We wish them the very best of luck and cannot wait to see their work shine on the big stage.

As we begin our Lenten journey this year, our Student Council have launched a special fundraising initiative to support Mission Together's Lenten Appeal 2026. This year, Mission Together is raising money to help children living in Cambodia, supporting the cost of teachers, meals, and stationery, as currently only 37% of children can access free early-years education.

LENTEN PLEDGE

To help your child make a meaningful Lenten commitment, families might choose pledges such as:

- Giving up chocolate or sweets
- Doing an extra household job
- Giving up screen time one evening a week
- Helping a sibling
- Reading or quiet reflection each day
- Choosing to walk instead of drive short distances
- Speaking kindly and helping others at home
- Helping with meals or tidying



All donations must be made **online**. Each child is encouraged to complete one chore at home each week, earning £1 per week. At the end of Lent, families will donate their **£5 total through our school's JustGiving page**.

When donating, families **must** include their family name so that we can allocate 10 PTA Pounds to your child for use at the Lenten Sales.

Please note:

- Children will only receive PTA Pounds once an online donation is made.
- Extra PTA Pounds cannot be brought in or purchased on the day.

Thank you for your generosity and support. Together, we will help Mission Together bring education, hope, and opportunity to children in Cambodia this Lent.



Student Council - Lenten Sales

As we begin the season of Lent, we are delighted to share details of our **5-week Lenten Sales Fundraising Event**, led by our Student Council. This year, our school will support **Mission Together's Lenten Appeal 2026**, which is raising funds for children living in **Cambodia**, specifically those attending **Sacred Heart Kindergarten**. Many families in this community struggle to access early-years education, and currently only **37% of children** can attend free schooling supported by the Church.

Your donations will help Mission Together provide:

- **Teachers' salaries**
- **Meals for the children**
- **Stationery and learning resources**

Over the next **five weeks of Lent**, each child is encouraged to take part in simple acts of service at home. The aim is for children to complete **one chore each week**, earning **£1 per week**, totalling **£5** by the end of the fundraising period.

These small acts help children understand:

- the meaning of **sacrifice**,
- the value of **charity**, and
- how their actions can make a **positive impact on others**.

- Cash donations will not be accepted in school.
- Additional PTA Pounds cannot be purchased or brought in on the day of the sales.

To celebrate the children's efforts, every pupil who donates will receive **10 PTA Pounds** to spend at the Lenten Sales. Our Student Council will be setting up a variety of fun stalls and activities for the children to enjoy.

- Giving up screen time for one evening each week
- Reading quietly or praying for five minutes daily

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about CONSPIRACY THEORIES

Conspiracy theories are false or misleading beliefs that explain events as secret plots, often involving powerful groups. While once fringe, they are now more accessible through digital media, online influencers and because of algorithmic recommendations. The DfE guidance document, 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) explicitly recognises conspiracy theories as potential content risks. This guide will help parents and educators understand the risks, spot the signs, and build children's resilience to conspiracy theories.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

UNDERMINING TRUST

Conspiracy theories can lead children and young people to distrust democratic institutions and British Values, teachers, and even their own families and loved ones. This erosion of trust makes young people more vulnerable to extremist narratives by isolating them from reliable sources of information.

ONLINE ALGORITHM TRAPS

Social media platforms can often recommend sensationalist content. Once a child engages with one conspiracy-themed video or post, algorithms push more of the same, thereby creating an echo chamber that can intensify their beliefs.

MENTAL HEALTH IMPACT

Exposure to frightening conspiracy content, such as global plots, viruses, or government control, can fuel feelings of anxiety, paranoia, or hopelessness. For some young people, it can trigger prolonged distress or obsessive thinking.

GATEWAY TO EXTREMISM

Conspiracy theories can often overlap with extremist ideologies. Narratives that blame specific groups, such as politicians, scientists, or particular ethnic groups, can groom children in ways that foster hate, bigotry, and radicalisation.

CONFLICT WITH PEERS

Belief in conspiracy theories can lead to isolation or conflict at school. Children may struggle with peer relationships if they express these beliefs or become distrustful of others who disagree; sometimes, confrontation can even result in a strengthening of the belief in the conspiracy theory.

ERODED CRITICAL THINKING

Young people influenced by conspiracies may reject evidence-based learning. This risks undermining their academic progress and weakening their ability to think critically, assess risks, or engage in healthy debate.

Advice for Parents & Educators

I WANT TO BELIEVE

CREATE SAFE CONVERSATIONS

Don't mock or dismiss any questions that children and young people ask about conspiracy theories. Instead, create open, judgement-free spaces to talk. This strengthens trust and makes it more likely they will confide in you.

PROMOTE CRITICAL THINKING

Teach young people how to assess information critically. Encourage them to ask appropriate questions, such as: Who is telling me this? What evidence is there? What do other trusted sources say? Use real examples from current media to explain your answers and reasoning.

MONITOR DIGITAL BEHAVIOUR

Be aware of the content children are accessing, especially on platforms such as TikTok, YouTube, or Reddit. Use parental controls, but more importantly, maintain ongoing dialogue about online experiences and influencers.

REINFORCE RELIABLE SOURCES

Point children toward trustworthy and reliable sources of news and information in a variety of formats tailored to the young person's age. Build habits of verifying facts using reliable sources, and teach them how to spot misleading content.
