Dear All

It has been another hot week (but luckily not into red warnings!). The children have continued to enjoy the sprinklers throughout the day and ice pops in the afternoons, and we have kept them in the shade as well.

Year 1 took part in a Jewish workshop on Tuesday to deepen their learning in this area. It is great to have the curriculum enriched in this way and, in addition, they had another treat on Wednesday in the form of Mr Farraj and Mrs Crouch who joined us again this year to share their expertise as a pilot and cabin crew. The children had an exciting time simulating a flight!

We held a History exhibition on Wednesday afternoon to showcase the children's topic work across the school. Some of the children helped to explain the beautiful displays to our visiting parents and it was such a wonderful event!

We also welcomed our new reception pupils and parents for another visit on Wednesday afternoon. The children were delighted to join us, and it was great to give them another opportunity to spend some time in their new school.

International day was a great success yesterday. The children arrived in an array of colours and outfits to represent their culture. We had such fun in the parade at the beginning of the day to showcase each class and danced as a whole school - these are the days the children remember!

A gentle reminder - if you have not yet completed the Free School meal form that the office has recently sent out, could you please do so before the end of term as this information enables us to claim valuable funding. Even if you think your family may not be eligible, we would appreciate these returned.

A local resident has drawn attention to a concern about a parade of cars in the morning and pick up time keeping their engines on. For those diesel and petrol cars that is a sizeable amount of carbon emissions over the school year, not only impacting our environment but the health of those in the vicinity, including the children and teachers. Parents are reminded that all children of primary age should be accompanied to the gate for safeguarding reasons and so we ask that parents find a safe place to park and turn off their engines before walking pupils in please.

In this Sunday's Gospel, through the parable of the sower, children are reminded to be 'good soil' ready for God's Word to be planted and grow in their hearts and lives. As the school year comes to an end, children will have the opportunity to identify how God was with them through times of challenge, and look forward with the hope they have in Him.

The Week That Was - KS1

EYFS: This week, Reception have been learning about the Sikh celebration of Vaisakhi. We watched as a family prepared for the day and then celebrated together and attended a big parade. We will continue with our learning of Sikhi next week with a special visitor to tell us more. In Literacy we have been reading the story "Pirates in the Supermarket". We used our Fred talk to write lists for the pirates. We had great fun taking part in International Day and learnt to say hello in lots of different languages!

Year 1: What another busy week! We have continued our learning about Judaism in RE and enjoyed a very interesting Zoom session with a representative from the Jewish Museum. The children learnt so much and asked some excellent questions. We then made our own kippahs to consolidate our learning. In English, the children have continued writing their own biographies. These will be passed on to Year 2 as their final piece of Year 1 writing for their new teacher to read. We have been working hard in Maths, learning about money and beginning our work on time, including the days of the week. On Wednesday, we had a visit from Mr Farraj and Mrs Crouch to enrich our Transport topic. Their presentation, all about air travel and British Airways, was extremely interesting, and the children were highly engaged throughout. We hope they enjoyed sharing their goody bags with you at home.

Well done, Year 1!

Year 2: Year 2 have looked at Shabbat a bit further this week, understanding in detail what they can and can't do on their day of rest. We watched videos following a child's story of what they got up to, which was very insightful and interesting for the children. We have been looking at pictograms in detail. And how to change a tally chart to a pictogram which the children are getting better at. We had our History exhibition this week and the children were so excited to show off their work to everyone and explain what we had been learning. In RSE we have been looking at what people around the world are like compared to us and how it is a great thing that we are all unique. The children have worked so hard this week, especially in this heat so well done Year 2 you are smashing it!

The Week That Was - KS2

Year 3: This week in Year 3, we had so many exciting opportunities to learn from one another and the world around us. In RE, we were lucky enough to hear from a Muslim visitor, who shared their experiences of Islam with us. We enjoyed asking lots of questions and learning more about how the Five Pillars of Islam guide and shape a Muslim's daily life. In Computing, we became coding detectives, working with a partner to find and fix mistakes in our Scratch programs. It was great fun spotting bugs and discovering how important debugging is! In Science, we took our learning outdoors to explore the different types of leaves around our school, using our observation skills to investigate how veins help plants transport water and nutrients. In History, we had some fantastic discussions about whether local heritage sites should be preserved and why they are important to our community. We were especially proud to share our learning during our wonderful History Exhibition Day, celebrating all that we have learned this half term. We also enjoyed a fantastic International Day, where we celebrated the many cultures, faiths, identities, and backgrounds that make our school so special. It was lovely to learn more about each other, share our experiences, and strengthen the friendships that make Year 3 such a welcoming and inclusive place to be.

Year 4: Year 4 have had another busy and exciting week of learning. In RE, we have been learning about different Catholic Rites, focusing on the Byzantine Rite, one of the ancient traditions of the Catholic Church. We discovered that it has its own style of worship, prayers and beautiful icons, while sharing the same Catholic faith. We used our learning to create fact files. We also explored the Anglican Church and made fact files about its history and beliefs. Learning that King Henry VIII founded the Anglican Church sparked lots of wonderful questions and discussions! We have also been learning about charities, including Stonepillow, City Angels, Street Angels and Christian Aid. Using our knowledge, we created informative videos to share with our local community about how we can support and help others, following God's example of love and kindness.

In Maths, we learned about coordinates, explored the x and y axes, and practised plotting coordinates accurately. In History, we proudly displayed and shared our learning at the St Cuthbert's History Exhibition. We loved presenting our Suffragette chants, learning about Dick Turpin, discovering Sir Robert Peel's idea of the "perfect policeman", and exploring how crimes and punishments have changed throughout history. We still can't believe that celebrating Christmas was once considered a crime! In RSE, we explored a dilemma faced by Chiwa in Malawi, who had to choose between staying at home to work or going to school. This helped us think deeply about how we would feel if we were unable to attend school ourselves. We also celebrated International Day with a colourful parade in the playground and enjoyed learning how to say "hello" and "thank you" in different languages from around the world. To end the week, we got busy in DT, baking and adapting recipes by adding extra ingredients to suit different target audiences. It was a delicious way to finish a fantastic week of learning!

The Week That Was - KS2

Year 5: Year Five have worked incredibly hard this week in the rising temperatures. In RE, the children continued their learning about Judaism and focused on the Shema prayer. In English, the class have been fine tuning their speech writing skills and have been practicing accuracy in their use of punctuation when recording speech in a story. In Maths, there has been some tricky calculations to navigate as the children have been converting imperial units to metric! RSE has been exploring the word 'biodiversity' and how we can embrace the worlds diverse habitats and what we can do to help to keep habitats thriving. Science has seen the children continue to learn about life cycles. This week they learnt about mammals that have a gestation period.

Year 6: Year 6 has enjoyed another exciting and memorable week packed with learning, reflection and celebration. We were delighted to share a beautiful Buddy Mass with our Year 1 buddies, focusing on the theme of new beginnings. We were also fortunate to take part in a fascinating Calculator Workshop led by Mr Creen from Salesians. The children explored different ways calculators can be used to solve problems efficiently and gained a greater appreciation of mathematical thinking.

This week, we proudly celebrated International Day, learning about and recognising the many cultures, languages and traditions that make our community so special. Finally, our History Museum Exhibition was a wonderful success, showcasing our learning in our Impact of War topic. We also completed our DT cooking unit, reflecting on our culinary creations and evaluating the success of our final products. Well done, Year 6!

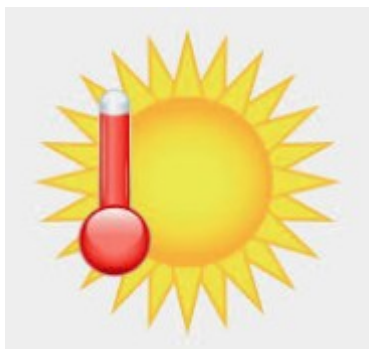


Our lost property collection is growing! Please take a moment to check the lost property basket in the school office before the end of term.

Sun Safety at School

We do not permit children to bring suncream into school. This is for health and safety reasons—e.g. allergic reactions/accidental ingestion.

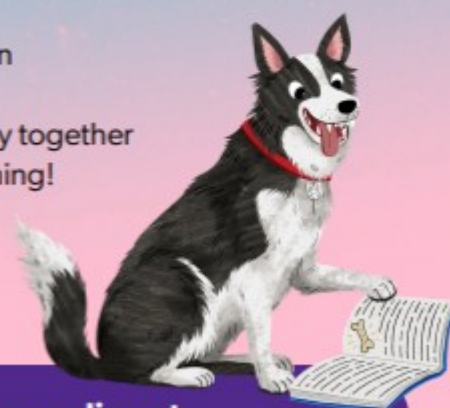

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about STREAMERS

Livestreaming has become a big part of the entertainment people consume, and what began as a series of gamers sharing their screens has grown into a huge industry packed with personalities - and potential risks for your children. With over 2.5 million people watching Twitch, the most popular streaming service, at any one time, it's important to remain aware of the risks associated with streamers.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some gaming streamers will stick to family-friendly titles, but others will play more violent games that tend to be more popular. Non-gaming streamers could, in theory, discuss just about anything, and some streamers will often stream in revealing outfits.



NEGATIVE INFLUENCES

While things have improved, streamers are often paid by companies to promote products, and this isn't always stated explicitly. While it's unlikely these goods will be harmful to your child, some streamers and influencers have engaged (knowingly or not) in scams in the past.



FINANCIAL HARM

Streamers will often have donation buttons on their screens for users to submit money. What can start as small amounts can quickly spiral as streamers engage with paying viewers more often, potentially leading to financial issues.



UNREALISTIC EXPECTATIONS

Influencers often showcase how glamorous their lives are, making some users feel as though they are lesser. However, it's important to stress that, in many ways, this is an act, or at the very least, not common. Logan Paul, who has been successful as a streamer and influencer, has a Pokémon card worth \$5 million, but this is atypical of anyone working in the medium.



MISINFORMATION

Streamers are, in many ways, just like us - and they can get things wrong or reel off an opinion without having thought about it. Some can simply say awful things to get a rise out of viewers or to sway them to their side of a hot topic.



ADDICTION AND SCREEN TIME

If your child is watching a lot of a particular streamer, it can be just as damaging to their social life as playing too many video games.



Advice for Parents & Educators

EXPLAIN HOW STREAMING WORKS

For a younger viewer, being a streamer or influencer seems aspirational, but it involves a lot of work and no small degree of good fortune. Streamers are often managed and unable to speak freely due to sponsors, and influencers are just that - influencing young minds, for better or for worse.



CHECK OUT STREAMING PLATFORMS

While Twitch was the de facto streaming service for years, YouTube has gained popularity, too. Then there are Kick and Bumble, which have grown in popularity with meows for big-name streamers - despite many being dogged by controversy.



DO NOT LOG PAYMENT INFORMATION

Streamers can reward donations with additional content, on-camera "shout outs" and more. If you're unsure about who or what your child is watching, consider avoiding linking payment information. This is especially notable with Twitch, which is owned by Amazon and therefore has some crossover.



SET SCREEN TIME LIMITS

You can set screentime limits for mobile apps on iOS and Google, but with other platforms like a PC it may be more difficult to keep tabs. Consider checking in regularly to ensure your children aren't watching content they shouldn't be.

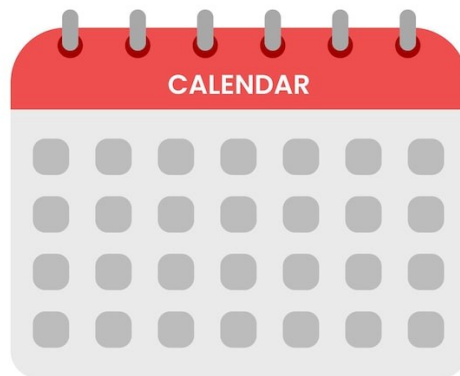

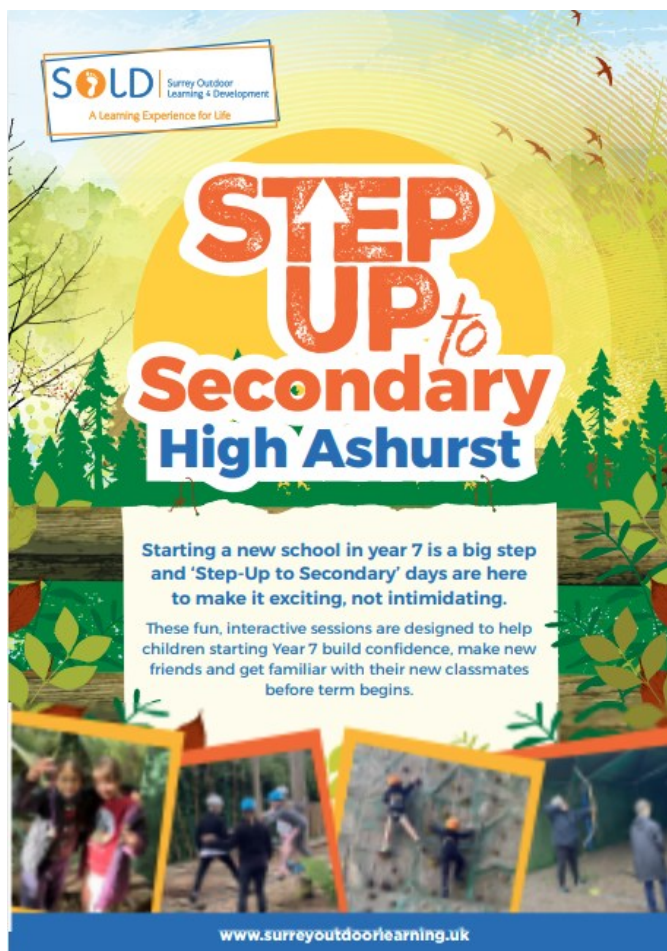
